HDCA Chair's Report – AGM 2019

The 2018/19 HDCA innings got off to a shaky start with no available secretary to fill the role and some discussion about who was to captain the team. We recovered somewhat and certainly finished strong, and for that, I'd like to pay tribute to former Chairpersons John Morris and Rodney Cavalier for their support in laying the solid foundations.

Like any innings, we ebbed and flowed with some setbacks and successes. Through the efforts of many in the HDCA team, we had more successes and are well placed for a solid second innings in 2019/20.

As I look back on the significant events of this year or innings, it is very pleasing to reconnect with the substantial progress of so much, at the hands of so few. We are a small team, but just like our representative teams, we punch above our weight. Our Board of volunteers is small, passionate, caring, and knowledgeable. They remind me sometimes of the cast of MASH – they are all different, unique, skilled and argumentative at times, but they deliver when it counts.

Please join with me as we reflect on those significant events and achievements over the past year.

- We mourned the passing of Bob Cupitt.
- We have improved our administration through
 - o dedicated email addresses for the secretary and treasurer
 - o cloud-based storage for files
 - improved functionally of HDCA website through more news items and an umpires resource tab.
- Before the season, Graham, Jack, and Byron updated their playing conditions and aligned them with CNSW/CA pathway competitions.
- We held a successful Captains night and season launch with our Patron Graeme Watson delivering some great messages to those present. The event set the right tone for the season ahead.
- Byron put in a huge effort to ensure that a Stage 3 competition with four teams got up and worked hard to work with the respective coaches and clubs to meet the needs of the players and parents.
- A new Code of Conduct was implemented, which was also aligned with CA pathway competitions. The Commissioner, Rodney Cavalier, handled only three CoC matters, all with efficiency and promptness. He was ably assisted by the new Judiciary. Thanks go to them for the one hearing necessary – John Morris, Phil Yeo, and Graeme Watson. Player behaviour in senior cricket has improved with minimal reports and more enjoyment being the outcomes.
- The HDCA Grounds and Facilities Strategy was endorsed by the members after much work being done by Simon Haire and was recently praised and acknowledged by the Wingecarribee Shire's Sport and Recreation Committee.
- Our two curators, Damien McMillan, and Dave Canterbury have done a great job in improving Lackey and Welby turf pitches for 1st and 2nd grade. While there have been challenges with equipment, scheduling, and the weather, we are committed to supporting their efforts. The HDCA has purchased a new mower for Lackey and replacement roller for Welby during the year, while we have provided upgraded covers for both venues courtesy of the Bankstown Cricket Club.

- We thank Rina and the Bradman Foundation for their continued access of first-class facilities at Bradman Oval and use of meeting rooms. We are indebted to the Foundation for their support of local cricket.
- Funding was secured with the support of CNSW and Sport Australia to replace Stephens Park No 1 pitch, with more facilities to be upgraded in the next year. Works are approved and planned for Stephens Park No2 (pitch), Welby Oval (Awning and canteen), Bradman Oval (nets) and Bill O'Reilly Oval (pitch and nets).
- Brian and Jack, together with all the HDCA coaches have had a fine year with our representative players. Our U/16 team winning the inaugural Steve Edwards Trophy. Our other success came in the Jeffrey Cup under the leadership of Jack Whitfield, where we triumphed against more fancied opposition. Well done to all the coaches, players, and supporters involved in the HDCA representative program.
- Salman has run finance very well through the budgeting process and managed to keep the Association on track. He has also worked hard to establish a smoother electronic banking process to pay suppliers and umpires with a high degree of accuracy and timeliness.
- We have increased the match fees for umpires this season and taken over control of their payments. The umpires have filled in match reports for the first time, providing valuable information and feedback to the HDCA. The HDCUA through Angus, Richard, Norm, and the small team of officiators has been an important factor in seeing good cricket played.
- Rina and Rodney have represented us well with the new Greater Illawarra Zone. This has meant a revision in the HDCA Constitution, and special thanks go to Rodney Cavalier and John Morris for their assistance in the drafting process.
- We resolved the dispute around the formal name of the Bowral Blues Cricket Club.
- The resignation of Board member Geoff Prenter was a setback after a couple of months, but we thank him for opening the door to the Mittagong RSL as a sponsor with the HDCA for the next three years.
- Another setback was the loss of our Secretary, Nicola Krejci, in December but we were fortunate to have Peter Murko join us in January to continue the important role thanks to Peter for his hard work to get up to speed and give his best. Having two new secretaries in the year was not ideal, so thank you to everyone for their patience and support.
- We facilitated a free Level 1 coaching course in December with CNSW. Nine people attended and completed the course run by our own Scott Moran.
- We held a Master Blaster afternoon on Bradman Oval attended by former Australian cricketer, Mitchell Johnson. This was great for the kids and parent coaches to be part of and shows how lucky we are to be well connected in the national cricketing community.
- Rina and Jock have ran the first all-female cricket competition on behalf of the HDCA. Whacky Wickets saw 43 females play the game on a Friday evening for several weeks pre and post Christmas. Thanks to Rina, Jock, and the Bradman Team.
- The HDCA has secured the sponsorship of Kingsgrove Sports. Not only do they offer the product range, service, and discounted pricing to our clubs and players, but the HDCA receives a 5% rebate on all purchases to put back into the local game.
- The Board and Members approved the new role of HDCA Secretary Administrator in May. After advertising the position and conducting interviews, we welcome Tahlia Wellington as the HDCA's new Secretary Administrator for 2019/20 as we seek to strengthen our organisation and better support the volunteers.
- Rina Hore announced her resignation from the Board after nine years (we think). We thank Rina for her enormous contribution to the HDCA and are pleased to see her continue to be

involved in a non-director capacity next year. We are very fortunate to have Rina in our ranks together with the support and resources of the Bradman Foundation.

- Special thanks go to Rob Collins for assisting us with repairs and maintenance to our equipment when they have broken down and for giving the replacement roller the thumbs up. Contributions like Rob's are the backbone of our Association.
- Thank you to Phil Benson who has given his time and put back into the game to take many great photographs of the cricket matches and shared them with Clubs, players, umpires and the HDCA. Phil has captured some great memories for us.
- We continue to grow a better relationship with Wingecarribee Shire Council and their staff. Rachel Forte, Michelle Green, and Mark Tickner have all been supportive of our needs, and we continue to work with them in a spirit of partnership to improve facilities and access.
- Congratulations to Mittagong Cricket Club and their senior grade captains in winning the HDCA Spirit of Cricket award this year it is pleasing to see this result for Mittagong.
- Congratulations also to Dean Roxburgh from Robertson Burrawang who was voted the HDCA 1st grade player of the year.

Our work in serving the game and the participants have no finish line. There is much to be done in the coming year. The Board's focus will be on;

- growing Stage 3 junior participation numbers,
- strengthening senior cricket especially 1st-grade numbers,
- improving the quality of facilities, and
- increasing enjoyment and access for all.

In conclusion, I'd like to pay tribute to all the HDCA Board members and Club office bearers for your efforts, contribution, and support. It is only by working together that we can grow cricket locally and offer similar experiences and memories to others that we had playing, umpiring, or supporting ourselves. Above all, we must continue to respect the other persons' strengths and points of difference. Passion is great; conflict and fighting are unacceptable in this cricket community. I'm honoured to serve the HDCA and this game of cricket and look forward to doing so again next year.

HDCA Junior Cricket Report

The junior competition was, I felt, quite successful this season despite some minor hiccups.

Commencing in the new role as Junior Cricket Director it took a while to find my feet however with the support of the board members and the help from club delegates, I soon worked out the fundamental elements of the role.

Starting with the early junior meeting we made a number of changes to our stage criteria from the age to a school year format. Nominations grew to record levels, and despite what the Australian cricket teams were going through, the enthusiasm for junior community cricket was buoyant.

Master Blast saw seven Teams compete during the pre-Christmas period and there were a number of players that came back post school to compete in the Red Ball competition.

The Red Ball Competition concluded in March and the experience gained by the participants was quite valuable and the players will now have a great lead into the Stage 1 competition next season. *Steve Beveridge was to be commended for his efforts in jointly running the competition.*

Stage 1

Teams in this grade didn't play Finals however the feedback from most people was to shorten the competition if possible next season.

I managed to get to a number of matches through the season and the competitiveness was quite evident especially between team's members when batting.

Stage 2

The competition was spilt into A and B divisions after all teams had played each other. Division A

Bundanoon were undefeated Minor Premiers .

The Final was played between Bundanoon V Bowral Thunder at Bundanoon resulting in a victory to Bowral Heat by 2 runs

Division B

Bowral Scorchers were Minor Premiers.

Bowral Scorchers played Oxley College in the final resulting in a win by 18 Runs to Scorchers in a closely contested match.

Umpires and coaches all commented on how the games were played in the correct sprint and how the players showed constant improvement throughout the season.

Stage 3

Bowral Blues were Minor Premiers and played Bowral CC in the Final at Centennial on 23rd March Bowral Blues won by 15 runs in another closely fought match.

Coaches and spectators all agree that both teams displayed respect throughout the year and the standard of play in this division improved all season.

Stage 3 teams also played the inter association games with the Goulburn Based team which was a great experience as almost all away games were on turf.



Moving into the next season (2019/2020) Changing the format of the Stage 3 competition was discussed at junior meeting in March.

We may look at playing some preseason games with the Goulburn District Junior Cricket Association plus if teams are interested having a team from Goulburn entering into a under 16/ Stage 3 inter association Competition.

More Discussion will be held over the off season.

Goals for 2019/20

To grow the Junior Competition, we all should be looking at developing as many aspects we can and look for support, assistance from time to time We are all volunteers and so sharing the work load through your clubs and schools is essential.

Cricket Australia, Cricket NSW and HDCA offer numerous levels of assistance and some time the answer is only phone call away.

Focus points

- Encouragement for current coaches to have combined training/skills sessions and implement use of resources from CA Junior cricket coaching website
- Clarifications of current guidelines regarding when and where matches can be played in member regulations, including regular participant feed back
- Reminders that playing conditions should be adhered to at all times and to seek clarification when in doubt

Grounds:

We look forward to having both Stephen Park 1 and 2 ready for next season. Exeter Oval is also due to have new surface on the Pitch. Looking at using Welby synthetic for junior on a Saturday Morning in the future after positive discussions with Curators.

Umpires:

Thanks to Angus Humphreys and the Umpires association for accommodating a number of umpires for the junior finals.

I look forward to more umpires joining the ranks next season

- I have sent out notices to clubs regarding parents involved in junior cricket to complete Umpire community Cricket course and Level 2 Coaching Courses that will be run throughout the winter season for interested people.
- Cricket NSW umpire coordinator has offered to run community Cricket course in the highlands if we can get a minimum of 8 participants.

Development of Junior competitions

Encourage Schools from all over highland to join into local competitions Cricket NSW will be in contact local schools soon.

• Encouraging parents and older sibling to get involve in Coaching, umpiring and scoring Some positive feedback in attending courses if they are held in highlands.

Encourage the senior cricket teams/ clubs to get involved with junior teams.

• Sent out CA community cricket flyer for feedback regarding Stage 1,2 and 3 cricket formats Some confusion as club contacts are not forwarding all the information to their coaches but I've followed up some coaches directly.

• Implement plans to grow player numbers/ teams and retain players.

Review formats for next season with a number of options spoken about.

Stage 3 going to a 40 over /2-day format?? Or a Mixture of both formats including 25/25 games Shortening the stage 1 and 2 competitions so they don't overlap with other sports.

- Consulting with other sport over off season regarding when they are planning their preseason games and avoiding overlaps in sports where possible.
- Making some minor changes to Playing conditions with regards to flexibility/ or restrictions between grades.
- Organised development officers from NSW Cricket to meet with local school/clubs to encourage participation.

The Bradman Carnival (20 years)

The Bradman Cup was played between U14 highlands rep team and other visiting teams from the 14th to 17thApril In the Highlands. Matches were at Bradman, Lackey and Welby.

Simon Taufel conducted a presentation on the Monday evening with the focus on "The spirit of Cricket "and everyone who attended appreciated the content. Rick McCarthy, coordinator from Bradman Foundation should be commended for his and his teams' efforts.

Senior Cricket Report: 2018 -19 Season

1. Clubs and Teams:

This season saw; 4 x First grade teams (81 players) 6 x Second grade teams (187 players) and 7 x Third grade teams (152 players)

As some players were involved in more than one grade the total number of players who took part in senior cricket this season was 352, this is up 12.5% on the previous seasons figure of 312.

2. Competition Format:

As a result of consultation with the playing group at the end of the 2017 – 18 season, second and third grade teams played all one day 40 over games apart from the T20 draw during January.

First grade played a combination of T20, 45 over one day games and 2 day games. The first grade draw was put together so each team played against each other twice for each format of the draw.

3. Ground and Playing Conditions:

The senior playing conditions were modified to fall in line wherever practical with representative playing conditions for the same game format. Wides, free hits on no balls and player safety around proximity to the bat and lightning strikes were updated. Overall the grounds were in acceptable conditions, apart from a couple of notable exceptions at Exeter (loose synthetic covering) Stephens Park (grass and outfield condition very tuffty and difficult to field on).

4. Plans for 2019-20 Season

Plans are well underway for some minor modifications to the draw and playing conditions for the 2019-20 season after meeting with all senior officials and representatives from each club and each grade.

Grounds and Facilities Report

The past year has seen a greater focus and investment placed into the cricket grounds and facilities around the Southern Highlands.

Maintaining grounds and providing turf wickets at Lackey Park and Welby Oval continue to be the biggest operational expense of the Association. We are proud to say that this year, through the magnificent efforts of our two curators, Damien McMillan and David Canterbury, the standard of turf pitches has improved significantly. These two gentlemen along with the efforts and support of Brian Martin, have contributed to better grass coverage, better bounce and more access to turf cricket for first and second grade players. Well done to these men. We should also thank the Wingecarribee Shire Council and their staff, in particular Rachel Forte, Michelle Green, Mark Tickner, Julianne Billington and all the other staff, for their cooperation and support as partners in sport.

We would like to acknowledge the continued effort of the Clubs to take greater ownership, care and development of their home ground facilities.

The HDCA Board has sought to support our curators, Damien and Dave, with better and more reliable equipment. Close to \$10 000 has been spent this year on a new mower for Lackey Park and a roller for Welby Oval.

The HDCA has also been focussed on improving playing surfaces for players. This year saw the Association successful with securing a grant of \$27000 from Sport Australia to replace the synthetic pitch at Stephens Park No1 oval. It has been installed post season and is wider and longer to better support our junior cricketers. We have also won a CNSW grant and partnered with Council to replace and upgrade Stephens Park No2 pitch in the coming year. Our thanks and appreciation is extended to CNSW, Wingecarribee Shire Council and Sport Australia for these investments in regional grassroots cricket.

The representative season began with an enthusiastic group, full of new faces which is always the case with U/12's being the first season of representative cricket. Only 3 players were backing up from last year so gaining experience and exposure to more competitive Representative cricket was our aim throughout the season.

Although it was not a successful one in terms of results, all players received significant opportunities and their cricketing knowledge and skill improvement across the board were very obvious by the completion of the 8 games.

We had 2 players make the Top 10 performers in the Zone :

HDCA U/14'S

2018/19 REPRESENTATIVE SEASON REPORT

The 2018 U14 HDCA Highlands team acquitted themselves well in a competition that proved to be of a very high standard. Initial selection of the team proved difficult as the Highlands club competition had been reduced to only four teams with the departure of Chevalier to ISA. Indeed, the Highlands U14 Representative team struggled for numbers throughout the summer and needed extra players to replace those who were unavailable or injured.

The first game that Highlands played was at Bradman oval against Illawarra Blue. Highlands bowled tightly and restricted Illawarra to being all out for 103 in the 36th over. Spinner Darcey McNamara finished with 4/26 off 8 overs, while Oliver O'Riordan bowled tightly and had 2/14 off 5 overs. Highlands made the runs in 31 overs thanks to good knocks from opener William Thomson (25) and Hayden Willebrand (39). Game 2 saw the Highlands away to South Coast. The home team batted first and made 153 in their full 40 overs. Highlands in reply could only manage 94 and lost steady wickets as the run chase ballooned. Finn Kaufline (19) and Hal Canute (18) were the best of the batsmen.

The following week, the Highlands played Shoalhaven in the first of a series of 20/20 matches and came close to an upset. Shoalhaven batted first and were 1/152 after 20 overs. Highlands lost wickets in the chase and finished with 6/128. Will Thomson (40) batted solidly and Hayden Willebrand (36) gave the visitors a sniff until holing out. In the next 20/20, South Coast set Highlands a target of 138. Finn Kaufline bowled with venom and picked up 4/19 in 4 overs, while Will Thomson chimed in with a handy 3/22. South Coast bowled tightly and were able to restrict Highlands to 107. Hal Canute (30), Will Thomson (25) and Hayden Willebrand (20) all batted well. Highlands then played Illawarra Blue and were able to keep them to a modest 8/82 with Hal Canute picking up 3/16 in his 4 overs. In reply, Highlands got the runs in 16 overs losing only two wickets. Hal Canute (32) and Will Thomson (19) scored freely. In the following game, Highlands were outclassed by the powerful Illawarra Red who were 4/174 after their 20 overs. Highlands reversed their batting to spread the load and finished with 6/49. Oliver O'Riordan (15) and Jack Ayling (14) were the pick of the batsmen.

Highlands then played Shoalhaven in a 40 over match and gave their more fancied opponents a scare. Highlands made 8/135 with Will Thomson (33) and Hayden Willebrand (31) anchoring the

batting. Shoalhaven looked in trouble, but finally got the runs in 36 overs at 7/136, with the bowlers sharing the wickets. In the final match of the series, Highlands lost to Illawarra Red. Highlands could only manage 7/112 with Hayden Willebrand and Finn Kaufline both top scoring with 19. Illawarra picked up the runs in 25 overs with Hal Canute (2/17) the best of the Highlands bowlers.

With a predominantly young team, Highlands U/14's were competitive and always played with a good spirit. They should be proud of their achievements throughout the competition.

Under 16 rep report

The U/16 team captained by Connor Taylor-Helmes were successful in winning the Steve Edwards cup defeating Shoalhaven in the Final.

The Highlands batted first on Bradman being 8 for 263 off their 50 overs with Liam Bayliss 63 and Oscar Murton 59 being the top scorers.

Shoalhaven were bowled out for 80 with Liam Bayliss 3/28 and leggie Tody Smith 4/11 being the main wicket takers.

Through the season they won 2 of the 3 games in both the 50 over format and the T20's.

The first incident occurred during a second-grade game. The offender had been swearing and using offensive gestures. He pleaded guilty to the charge. As this was a first offence, he was reprimanded.

The second and third incidents involved a threat of assault, a matter so serious the Commissioner referred the matter to the Judiciary. The Judiciary held a hearing and imposed a six-match suspension with advice for the club to be more caring about a player who was experiencing difficulty with his bowling. Evidence presented caused the Judiciary to be concerned about the conduct of a player off the field, cause sufficient for the Commissioner to cite the offender. The offender pleaded guilty and suffered a one-match suspension.

I pay tribute to the members of the Judiciary. Each of them is undertaking an essentially thankless task in his own time. I acknowledge their care in listening to the evidence and assessing it. The Association is well served by their dedication.
